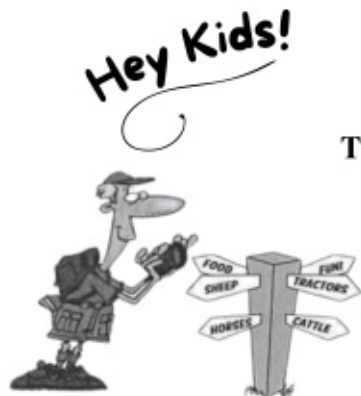

Rules and Regulations

- 1) The exhibition will be held in the building of the Durham Community Centre: grounds of Durham Agricultural Society and surrounding area
- 2) Payment of seven dollars will constitute an annual agricultural society membership and exhibitor fee, one membership card will be issued.
- 3) Each exhibitor must be a member of the Durham Agricultural Society before entries will be accepted. 4-H, Junior Calf Club, Hunter Jumper Horse and Western Horse Exhibitors, Junior Exhibitors, Group Display and Senior Citizens are not required to be members, BUT on entering regular classes, a membership will be required. This will be strictly enforced
NOTE: Exhibitors are requested to call the Secretary to secure a number
- 4) In case an error occurs in the printing of the prize list, the Directors have power to rectify the same.
- 5) All produce exhibited must be the property of the exhibitor. When more than one party enters for the same produce there must be a partnership having a common interest in such exhibit.
- 6) Each animal must be provided a chain or rope and be led into the show ring among those of its class.
- 7) Animals must have attached to them a number of which to designate them.
- 8) All produce must be the growth of the current year excepting small seeds, which may be the growth of the present or previous year and must have been grown by the exhibitor.
- 9) All farm implements must be on the grounds before 10 a.m. on the second day and remain on exhibition until 4:30 p.m.
- 10) Any person showing the same animal in the same Show as competing for two different prizes, except in team or especially mentioned or defrauding or attempting to defraud the Society, shall be deprived of any prize whatsoever at the same show and be expelled from the Society. This clause will be strictly enforced.
- 11) The Directors shall have the authority to refuse any entry suspected of being diseased in any way.
- 12) Exhibitors will be required to bring forward their stock when called by the judges, as no animal will be judged unless brought forward.
- 13) An exhibitor is limited to one entry per section of any class, excepting in livestock; and an exhibitor shall make no more than two entries in each section in these classes.
- 14) No one will be allowed to interfere, by conversation, or otherwise with a judge, while said judge is on duty, judging a class. Nor will anyone, on the fair premises, use any contemptuous or abusive language to any judge or officer of the Society. Anyone doing so will forfeit their right to any prizes and will be asked to leave the premises immediately.
- 15) Judges may use their own discretion as to awarding a first, second or third premium, and in all cases where they do not think the animal or article worthy, they may withhold any prize. Several 1st, 2nd and 3rd prizes may be awarded in each section. Once judges have agreed to judge, they are secured to the Society. Their personal information will not be released except by authority of the Executive.
- 16) In all cases of doubt or difficulty that may arise before making their awards, the judges shall submit the matter to one of the Directors and the President and two or more Directors may finally settle the same. Any member appealing against the Judges' decision shall deposit \$10.00 with the Secretary, the same to be forfeited if the appeal is not sustained. The decision of the Board to be final. All appeals must be in the hands of the Secretary within three days after Show Day.
- 17) Produce and domestic exhibits must be delivered between 6:00 p.m. and 8:00 p.m. on the day before the First Day of the fair or not later than 11 a.m. on the First Day of the Fair. No exhibitors will be allowed in the exhibit hall on the first afternoon of the Fair, until judging is completed. Once the exhibit is in place the exhibit is not to be moved again by the exhibitor or the public other than by the Directors in charge. Doing so will result in forfeiture of prize winnings. All entries must be entered on entry forms provided in this book and left in Secretary's office prior to judging. Please use entry tags as illustrated in the Durham fair book and provided by the society.
- 18) All exhibits in the Community Centre must not be removed until 4:30 p.m. on the second day of the exhibition. The Society is not responsible for indoor exhibits not removed after 4:30 p.m. Failure to remove exhibits by 6:00 p.m. may result in forfeiture of prize winnings.
- 19) No person shall conduct or carry out any gambling, theatrical circus, mountebank performance, exhibitions or shows, on exhibition grounds.
- Nor shall any person without the consent and permission of the Directors, carry on any traffic in fruit, goods, wares or merchandise on the exhibition grounds
- 20) In case of bad or unfavourable weather or other reasons causing the receipts to fall short of paying the expenses and all prizes in full, a proportionate amount exclusive of membership, will be deducted from such prize to enable the Directors to balance the accounts without loss.
- 21) Prize list open to all, irrespective of residence unless otherwise stated.
- 22) Where the Board has reason to believe a member or other exhibitor of farm products, animals or other goods has committed a fraud or made misrepresentation in respect of any such farm products, animal or other goods, the Board may withhold payment of any premium or prize to such person until such person proves to the satisfaction of the Board that no fraud or misrepresentation has been committed. If fraud or misrepresentation has been committed, the exhibitor may be prohibited from exhibiting for one year.
- 23) Every person who violates any of the provisions of this Constitution or the regulations shall be guilty of an offence and on summary conviction where no penalty is provided shall be liable to a penalty of not more than \$100.00.
- 24) While the Directors will take every possible precaution under the circumstances to secure the safety of the articles sent to the exhibition, the owners themselves must take the risk of exhibiting.
- 25) Next year's membership will be retained from each exhibitor winning over \$8.00 in prize money. Any prize money totalling less than \$1.00 will not be paid.
- 26) On all amounts over \$20.00 won by any member, 10 percent will be retained by the Society with the exception of cash classes and junior exhibitors.
- 27) The Society will not be responsible for the payment of Special Prizes. All prizes in goods must be claimed before December 31 st, of the current year.
- 28) Prize money offered as specials must be paid in full prior to the Fall Fair.
- 29) All prize money will be mailed by cheque unless previously paid by cash. The names of cash prize winners MUST be recorded on official Fall Fair paperwork.
NOTE that all cheques should be cashed within 6 months. All prize money cheques not cashed within 6 months will be null and void, and money will be retained by the Society.
- 30) The Society will not hold itself liable for any accidents happening at the Fair. Every Officer and Director shall be indemnified and saved harmless out of the funds of the Society from against all costs, charges and expenses incurred in and about any action or suit brought against him in respect of any deed performed during the execution of his office except where charges or expenses are incurred as a result of his own wilful neglect or default.
- 31) Should the Premises ID Certificate become mandatory it shall be posted in the Fair Book, at the Fair Secretary's Desk, and in the Livestock areas.
- 32) Livestock exhibitors must carry \$2 million insurance
- 33) Entry forms must be filled out or prize money will not be paid.
- 34) Any information collected by the Agricultural Society regarding members, exhibitors, commercial exhibitor, sponsors, or Directors and any other persons related directly to the business of the Agricultural Society and the Fair, and for the maintenance of their files and data base. Any member, exhibitor, commercial exhibitor, sponsor or Director realizes that when they agree to take part in the Agricultural Society and the Fair, that their names may be published for these reasons only. None of this information whatsoever will be sold or transferred to any outside party for any reason.
- 35) While the Directors recognize that Social Media is a tool, please refrain from any inappropriate comments and/or posts directed to the Durham Agricultural Society or Fall Fair.
- 36) The directors reserve the right to change, add or delete any rule as seen fit, up to and including the fair, under the Executive's direction.
- 37) These Bylaws shall be reviewed annually.

DURHAM TRACTOR PULL RULES AND REGULATIONS

3500LB - 12500LB SPEED LIMIT 8MPH, TRACTORS 35 YEARS AND OLDER

REGISTRATION 11:00 AM - 3:30 PM PULL STARTS AT NOON

1. All contestants PULL AT THEIR OWN RISK
2. Weight of tractor includes driver. 100 lbs over for error is allowed. Drivers must be at least sixteen (16) years of age. **The weight of the tractor pull driver will be strictly monitored.**
3. Contestants must not be under the influence of alcohol or drugs while on grounds.
4. No helpers allowed on track OR tractor during pull.
5. All tractors must have a muffling device and working brakes (straight pipes will be allowed)
6. Hook pulling point must not exceed 20' in height or interfere with hook. Pulling point must not be less than 18" from centre of axle (vertical hooks that allow hook to slide up, measurement will be taken at official's discretion). **The height of the hook pulling bar will be strictly monitored.**
7. **The 8MPH Track speed will be regulated and enforced**
8. Engine speed shall not be more than factory RPM plus 10%. All RPM limits apply to tractor chassis tag.
9. Tractors must have stock or manufacturers replacement parts.
10. No tractor shall have duals, tire chains, cut tires, or any intentionally altered tires.
11. Tractor must be weighed after pull.
12. Gas, diesel, or LP fuels only. Engines must be same # of cylinders, same manufacturer and same fuel types as original. No adapter plates, carburetors, manifolds, injection pumps, turbos, fuel systems, or exhaust systems. Governors must be stock locations and must maintain original appearance. No secondary fuels (alcohol, NOS, propane injection, etc.). Governor shall be working - no wire or strings attached.
13. Tractor must remain in neutral while being hooked or unhooked. Operator to keep both hands in air while being hooked or unhooked.
14. Driver should remain seated during the pull and be in complete control of the tractor at all times.
15. Tractor operated in an unsafe manner will be disqualified or banned from subsequent pulls at official's discretion.
16. Any tractor or puller found to be unsafe or illegal will be disqualified or barred from hooking.
17. Any parts or weights falling off the tractor will result in disqualification.
18. Contact point of tractor and sled must remain in bounds at all times. Out of bounds will result in disqualification.
19. Pull is over when forward motion has ended and all tractors must stop immediately upon signal from officials.
20. **A tractor may pull only once in each class.** Pull officials decided number of classes each tractor may enter into in excess of two.
21. All pulls must start with a tight hitch, and a green flag. No jerking permitted. Contestants will be allowed two consecutive attempts before 75' without reset.
22. First puller in each class has the option of a re-pull. A re-pull will be in the 3rd position. The 2nd attempt counts.
23. If tractor jumps out of gear or stops due to engine failure, you may restart at the spot you stopped.
24. If a 'pulling tractor' should develop engine failure, it may drop out and pull again at the end of that class, as determined by track officials and only if time permits.
25. No weights on platform OR behind the rear axle.
26. If the "Rules and Regulations" form is not signed, NO PULL.
27. **Pullers MUST obey officials. The interpretation & application of the above set rules are at the discretion of the Pull Committee. The decision is final from the weigh master, flagman, and track officials. Violation of the rules, or arguing with the officials will constitute disqualification. Although competitive, this pull is intended to be fun. No person shall change any results- it is the responsibility of the regulators to confirm "IF" a change is required.**
28. Contestants shall have their own liability insurance and provide proof upon request.

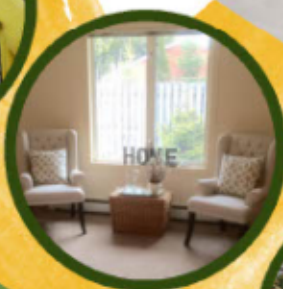

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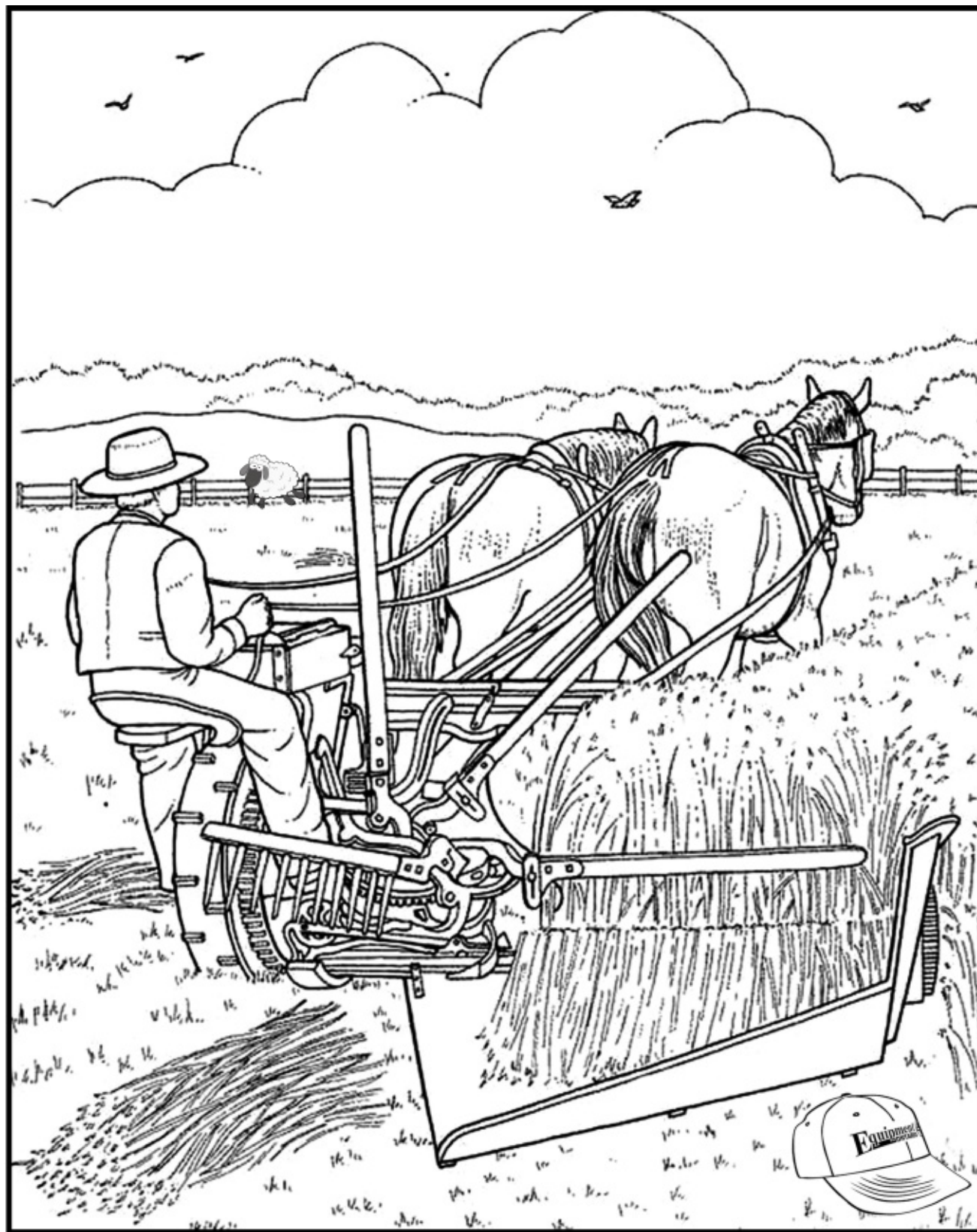

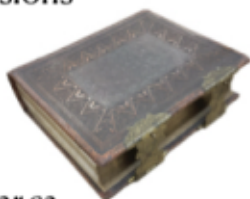

Spray: A spray is the terminal flowering growth of an herbaceous or woody plant carried on one stem. Ideally it would show all stages of development, e.g., flowers in bloom, buds showing colour, green buds and leaves.

Stem: A main plant structure which supports flowers, buds, leaves or fruit.

Bloom: An individual flower, one to a stem.

Bud: A bud showing colour is considered a bloom.

Spike: Upright stem with several flowers which are nearly stemless, e.g. gladiolas or liatris.

Rules:

1. NO flower arranging in the hall on the day of judging.
2. No exhibitor will be allowed into the hall after 11:30 AM Friday.
3. All reasonable precautions will be taken to safe guard exhibitor's containers, however the Durham Agricultural Society cannot be responsible for any breakage or theft.
4. Please Place all top-heavy flowers in a weighted container.
5. Exhibiting is open to amateurs only. Flowers must be grown by the exhibitor unless stated otherwise.
6. In the design classes, use fresh flowers and foliage only unless otherwise stated. Additional accessories may be added to carry out your interpretation of the theme. The style of design is judged based on the principles and elements of design.
7. Diseased, insect infected and invasive plants and flowers will not be accepted.
8. The committee will not subdivide a class.
9. The judges' decisions are final.
10. Judging is based on the OAAS General Rules and the Ontario Judging and Exhibiting Publication 2019.
